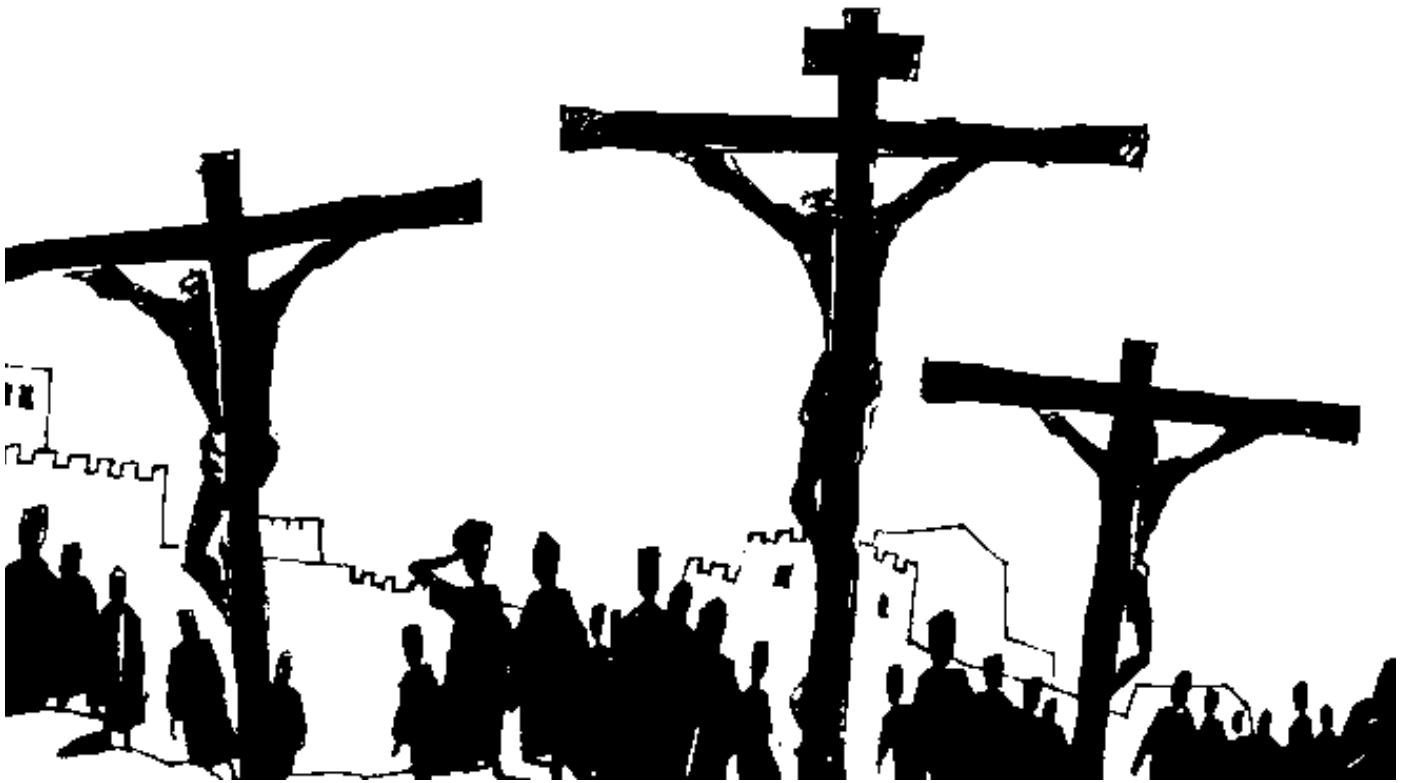



It was with sadness that we learned of the death of John Wallace on 21<sup>st</sup> Feb. 2006 in Perth Infirmary. John, and his wife Evelyn had moved from Barrhead to Bridge of Earn in 2003, so that they could be nearer their daughter Sandra.

John will be remembered by many in Barrhead through his work in the motor trade, his church activities and his singing. Everyone who knew him will remember his cheerful disposition and his kindness to those he met.

These qualities were to serve him well in the motor trade where he worked for McDiarmid's. John started off as a mechanic and then became involved in the sales aspect and eventually was appointed as General Manager. John enjoyed the trust of those who came to buy a car and he certainly didn't disappoint.

John had served in the Royal Navy during the Second World War and achieved the rank of Chief Petty Officer. He served on Landing Craft and was involved in the D-Day landing at Sword Beach. His craft was mined as was the next one he boarded and he only survived by swimming to a third.

John had a great love of choral singing and he was a member of the Barrhead Philharmonic and the Thomas Coats Memorial Society as well as the Church Choir. He really did enjoy the fellowship of these days.

John and Evelyn have a son, Ian and daughter, Sandra and four grandchildren. Family life was always important to John and he loved to be involved with their activities wherever possible. He certainly was very proud of what his family had achieved.

John was ordained an elder at Bourock in 1957 and he received a long service certificate from the church. I know that many speak fondly of John's warmth and welcome towards new members and old members alike.

I know John will be sadly missed by family and friends and our prayers are with them at this time. We, in Bourock, give thanks for all he shared with us and added to our fellowship. "he fought the fight, he completed the course, he kept the faith"

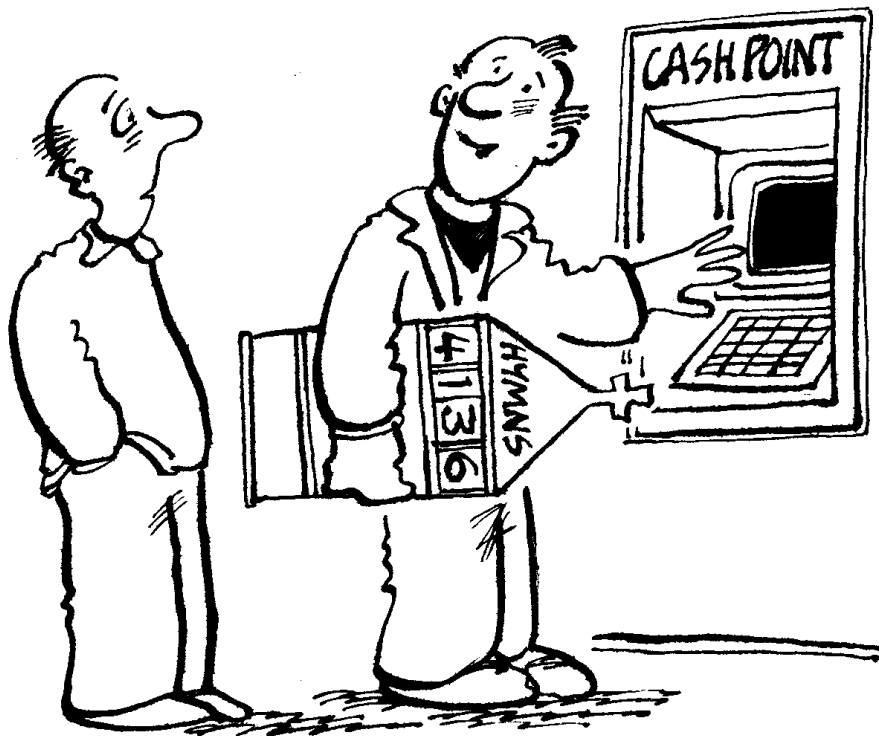
## Tweenies

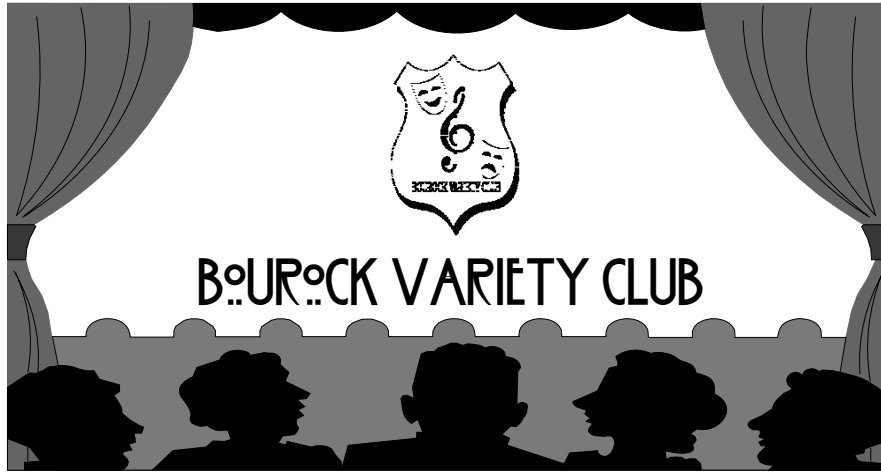

## Trip To The Holy Land

In January of this year I fulfilled a long held ambition. I visited the Holy Land!

This trip was undertaken as part of an organised group to take ministers of the Church of Scotland on a 'promotional' tour to familiarise them with the Holy Land.

We travelled out to Jerusalem and spent three days there, visiting sites such as the Mount of Olives, the Via Dolorosa, the Church of the Holy Sepulchre, The Western Wall (Wailing Wall), the Garden of Gethsemane and more. Our hotel was situated just outside the 'old wall's' of Jerusalem and to look out on them was amazing - what sense of history!

Looking down on Jerusalem from the Mount of Olives is quite stunning with the golden Dome of the Rock very prominent. The guides who accompanied us were excellent and they gave us all the background to the sites we were visiting. We also stopped and read appropriate passages of Scripture and sang hymns when we could. Standing at the top of the Mount of Olives, looking over Jerusalem, and hearing some 70 Scottish voices singing "All people that on earth do dwell" was quite a special moment.

We also travelled out through the "wall" (30 foot high concrete blocks) that surrounds Jerusalem to visit Bethlehem. It was quite a shock for us to encounter the security of Israel and having to go through a checkpoint caused everyone to fall silent.

Whilst in Bethlehem we visited the Al Shurooq school for blind children, which is run by an elder of the Church of Scotland in Jerusalem. Here we heard stories of how they struggle to keep going with little or no government support. Indeed we heard of the plight of many of the children whose lives are very difficult because the land which the families own have been confiscated –they lie on the Jerusalem side of the wall! Without a doubt, life is a struggle for many ordinary Palestinians. We went on to visit the Church of the Nativity, which is reputedly built over where Jesus was born

We also visited Joppa and Tabeetha School, where our Overseas Partner, Karen Anderson works.

Then it was a journey through the Judean wilderness down to the Dead Sea and Quumran. Here we saw the caves where the Dead Sea Scrolls were found - initially, by a shepherd boy, looking for a lost sheep, then by renowned scholars. We also studied the community where the Essenes had lived.

We travelled to Jericho and went, by cable car, up the Mount of Temptation. The view from the top was spectacular - over the Jordan valley and the Dead Sea. Here we viewed caves in which monks still retreat in order to reflect and they have their food lowered in baskets!

Following that, we travelled along the Jordan Valley to Tiberias which would be our base for the next three days. We stayed in the Scots Hotel which is owned by the Church of Scotland - it was once a hostel for pilgrims but is now a 5 star hotel.

This area is where Jesus spent much of his teaching and healing ministry. We visited the Church of the loaves and fishes, the Mount of the Beatitudes and, one of my personal favourites, Capernaum.

A special time was the visit to Mensa Christi. Here on the beach is the place Jesus appeared to his disciples after the Resurrection. It is a lovely place and there is a wonderful feeling of peace about it. It was really nice to have a Communion Service on the shores of Lake Tiberias.

We were treated to a lunch of Peter's fish - 'nice' if you can work your way round all the bones - it is served in its entirety - a bit off-putting for some!

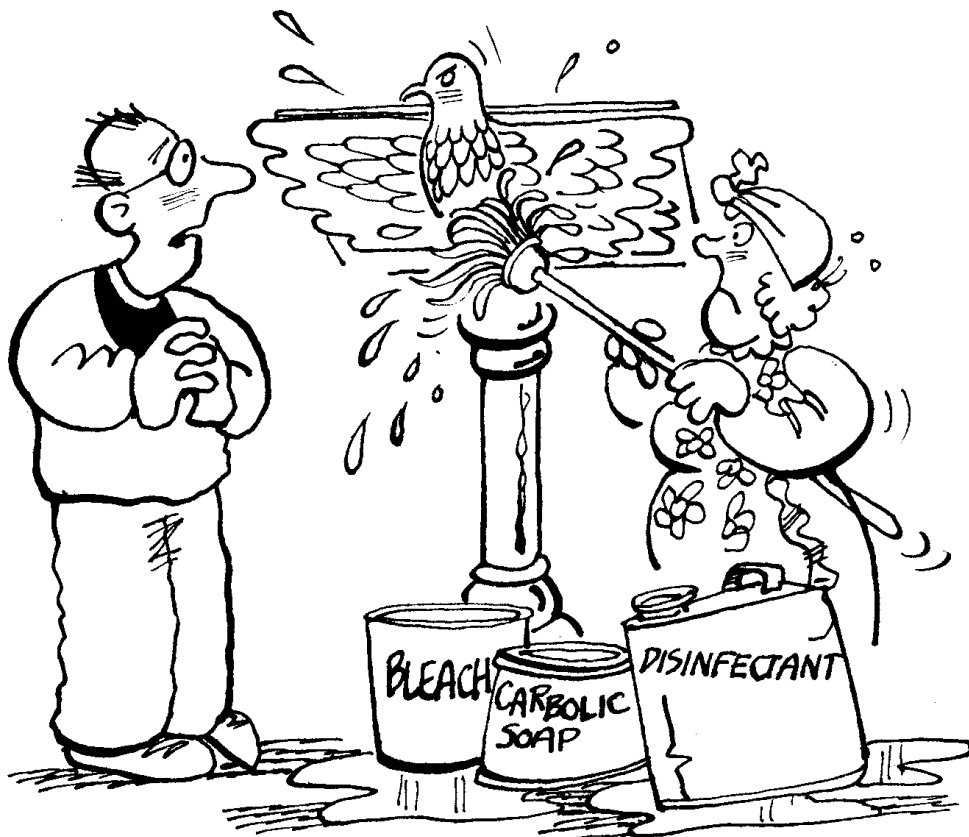
We sailed on a boat and were treated to a fishing lesson by our host. He demonstrated how the disciples would have fished in Jesus' day. He didn't catch anything!

Our last day saw us in Nazareth. We visited the Basilica of the Annunciation and the Church of the Annunciation - one Orthodox and the other Roman Catholic. Both were beautifully decorated but in very different styles. We also visited a recreation of Nazareth village. It was very well presented and offered a good insight into life in Jesus' day.

It was a wonderful trip and there was just so much to take in. I certainly will look at Scripture passages in a different way now because I have a better sense of the geography. The trip certainly has given me much food for thought.

In the future, I would like to take a group from Barrhead out to the Holy Land. It certainly is worth visiting. The accommodation and the guides are excellent and I think it would be an experience you won't forget in a hurry. So if you are interested, speak to me or listen for an intimation

## Finance Report - March 2006

The following is a report on the Church's Accounts presented at the Stated Annual Meeting for the financial year 2005 and should be read in conjunction with these Accounts. In line with the General Assembly's guidelines, a summary is included in the next page.

We started off 2005 by carrying forward a small deficit of £672 from 2004; this was taken from the General Fund, meaning as at 1<sup>st</sup> January 2005 the General Fund stood at £10,155. You will notice at 31<sup>st</sup> December 2005 the General Fund now stands at £10,742, and increase of £587, however this is offset by a considerable reduction in the Ferguson Bequest – (see later on).

During 2005 total offerings rose by £2,330. Total offerings received via WFO and Standing Order rose from £50,972 in 2004 to £53,676 in 2005, an increase of £2,704 – this is encouraging as there has been a significant increase in the income we claimed Gift Aid on (around 9%). In addition we earned a substantial sum from letting other organisations use our premises.

Expenditure rose by £5,829 in 2005 in comparison to 2004, which can be summarised as follows –

- A significant increase in National Ministry and Mission & Wider Work, over which we have no control. This is set to rise further in 2006.
- Lower Local Staffing Costs, mainly due to a reduction in the hours worked by a cleaner.
- Increase in Buildings Costs, which included necessary repair work on the manse grounds – the cost of this was taken from the Ferguson Bequest.
- Considerable reduction in Local Costs.

We also undertook major building work in order to comply with the Disability Discrimination Act, costing in excess of £45,000 – so far we have raised over £26,000 towards this and received £13,000 in grants – ultimately any shortfall will be taken from our reserves. It is not too late to donate further.

On behalf of the Finance Committee I would like to thank everyone who contributed to allow this work to proceed.

In 2005 we reclaimed over £11,000 back from the Inland Revenue - as this is just short of 14% of our total income for the year the significance of this income cannot be underestimated.

Should anyone who –

- currently contributes by WFO or Standing Order,
- pays income tax, &
- has not signed a Gift Aid declaration

please consider completing a Gift Aid form - any such income will allow the church to reclaim a further 28.2p for every £1 received, at no expense to you. Speak to Robert McKenzie, Karen Johnston or myself and we will provide you with the necessary form.

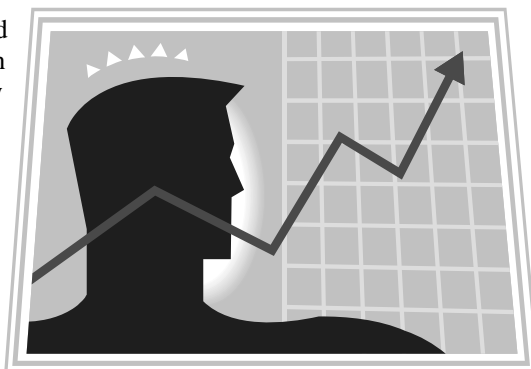
In 2005 over £21,000 (over £400 per week) was contributed where no income tax was recovered.

There are obviously members who do not currently pay income tax; therefore nothing can be recovered from their contributions. However I am sure there are many who do pay income tax and I feel it is worthwhile considering that for every £100 per week (£5,200 over the year) that Bourock can reclaim income tax on, the church will earn an extra £1466.40 per year – it is literally money for nothing.

Please consider the above if you are in such a position, as we are now so dependent on other income – almost a fifth of our total income in 2005 came from Gift Aid & outside lets.

Personally, I would like to thank all members of the Finance Committee for their assistance in 2005.

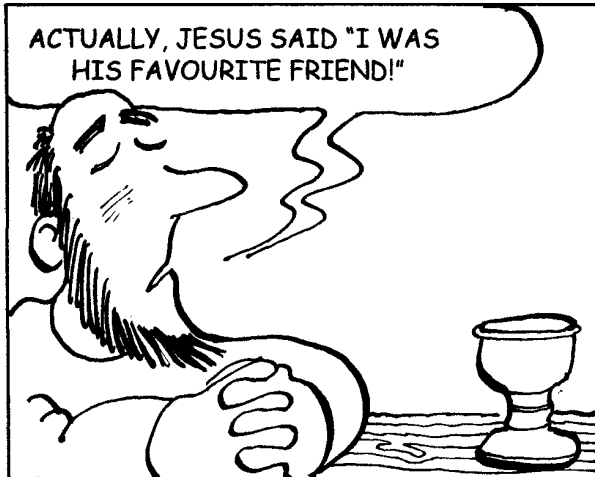
